The State requires cities like Sandy to proactively increase the availability of affordable housing within their boundaries. In order to do that, cities must select strategies from a list provided by the State. Below is a summarized list of those strategies. If you had to choose, which three of the following strategies would you recommend the City implement? *Please select three total strategies.*

- Promote medium to high density housing options near transit stations and commercial centers (around Sandy's downtown area, between Trax and I-15)
  - Encourage medium density infill or redevelopment in mixed-use/commercial areas along major roadways
  - Reduce developer costs, such as city fees or parking requirements, for new affordable housing developments
  - Allow for accessory dwelling units (basement apartments, guesthouses, etc.) in existing residential areas
  - Provide and/or subsidize for infrastructure or land for affordable housing development
  - City involvement in the construction of housing for seniors and/or public service employees (teachers, first responders, etc.)
  - Administer and/or subsidize programs that would prevent the loss of existing affordable housing
  - Pursue state or federal funding to finance additional affordable housing
  - Utilize state programs to generate funds for affordable housing
