RESOLUTION #23-45C

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF SANDY CITY RECOGNIZING
OVER 100 YEARS OF RESOLUTIONS AND ORDINANCES PASSED BY
THE CITY COUNCILS THROUGHOUT THE HISTORY OF SANDY CITY

WHEREAS IN 1893, Sandy City officially incorporated, passed its first laws, and
appointed its first Mayor and Council; and

WHEREAS IN 1917, The Sandy City Council adopted an ordinance that set the annual
salary of City Council Members to \$48; and

WHEREAS IN 1949, The Sandy City Council adopted an ordinance that stated it was
illegal for bars, saloons, theaters, banks, or workshops to be open on
Sundays; and

WHEREAS IN 1957, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that established the
Planning Commission of Sandy City; and

WHEREAS IN 1964, The Sandy City Council adopted an ordinance establishing the
different land zones within Sandy City; and

WHEREAS IN 1975, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution prohibiting smoking
in public buildings; and

WHEREAS IN 1979, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that changed Sandy
City's form of government to a Council-Mayor form of government; and

WHEREAS IN 1981, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that established the Alta Canyon Sports Center Special Service District and authorized the construction of the center; and

WHEREAS IN 1981, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution recognizing the Sandy Youth Council; and

WHEREAS IN 1985, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that established the Sandy Historic Preservation Committee; and

WHEREAS IN 1991, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that approved the bond resolution to fund the construction of the new City Hall located at 10000 Centennial Parkway; and

WHEREAS IN 1991, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that established the Justice Court of Sandy City; and

WHEREAS IN 1995, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that approved the funding for the construction of the Sandy City Senior Citizen Center; and

WHEREAS IN 1998, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that established the Public Utilities Advisory Board; and

WHEREAS IN 1998, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution authorizing the Municipal Building Authority to issue \$7.84 million in lease revenue bonds to finance the construction of the Sandy Amphitheater and Lone Peak Park; and

WHEREAS IN 2002, The Sandy City Council and Mayor jointly presented Resolutions of Commendations to organizations involved in the creation of the Healing Fields. 3,031 flags were placed on the Promenade to honor those lost in the

terrorist attack on September 11, 2001. The 2002 Healing Field was the first in the Nation and created a national movement to honor those lost in the 9/11 attacks; and

WHEREAS IN 2007, The Sandy City Council, acting as the Redevelopment Agency Board, adopted a resolution issuing \$35 million in Transient Room Tax Revenue Bonds to fund the acquisition of the land and pay for city permits, fees, reimbursements, and bond issuance costs associated with the ReAL Salt Lake soccer stadium; and

WHEREAS IN 2015, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution authorizing the sale and issuance of \$46.8 million in Sales Tax Revenue Bonds to fund the City's portion of the construction of Hale Centre Theatre, in partnership with the Hale Centre Theatre; and

WHEREAS IN 2015, The Sandy City Council approved ordinance amendments to the Sandy City Municipal Code, designating the Sandy City Animal Shelter as a no-kill shelter. The shelter achieves some of the highest animal save rates among shelters in the state of Utah; and

WHEREAS IN 2017, The Sandy City Council adopted an ordinance approving the Cairns Master Plan— a 25-year development plan for the Downtown District of Sandy City; and

WHEREAS IN 2022, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution that reinstated the Sandy Youth Council after a five-year program pause; and

WHEREAS IN 2022, The Sandy City Council adopted a resolution approving the new district boundaries map for the four City Council districts within Sandy City, in accordance with the population count of the 2020 Census;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE SANDY CITY COUNCIL DOES HEREBY RECOGNIZE THE RESOLUTIONS PASSED THROUGHOUT THE HISTORY OF SANDY CITY, BOTH LISTED HERE AND WITHIN SANDY CITY RECORDS, AS FOUNDATIONAL EFFORTS BY THE CITY COUNCILS OF SANDY CITY THAT ESTABLISHED OUR CITY AND EMBODY THE VISION OF “CONNECTING AN ACTIVE, VIBRANT, AND PROSPEROUS COMMUNITY, WHERE PEOPLE FLOURISH, AND YOU BELONG.”






