Thanks for all the information; I appreciate it very much.


I have two comments/questions;


1) I am absolutely for the moratorium on development along the Wasatch foothills, and agree that it should include the Little Cottonwood “triangle.” (Likewise with the foothills and triangle of Big Cottonwood Canyon, but I realize you don’t have jurisdiction there. I hope a wise Sandy decision may influence that community.). I’ll cast my vote right now for making the temporary action permanent. I think there are huge safety issues with the continuation of unfettered growth on such steep slopes.

2) I would love to see Sandy adopt Ranked Choice Voting. I’m not sure what you mean by “exhausting” a ballot. That doesn’t mean it’s void, does it? I personally don’t vote on a person or position if I don’t have information about the candidate or issue, so I can see myself in a 7-person race only filling out my top three choices. Maybe I need more education on the process....

Ranked Choice Voting — Coming to Sandy??

Last night the city council discussed adopting Ranked Choice Voting as a new way to elect our mayor and city council members. We vote next Tuesday, April 20th, on whether to adopt it. If passed, we also need to decide when to implement it.

Should we make the change effective immediately for this year's election? This could eliminate the primary (now scheduled for August 10th) and push back the filing period when candidates officially declare from June 1-7 to August 10-17. It would not change the general election date of November 2nd, and all the candidates would campaign all the way up to the general election.

To learn more about how RCV works, take a minute and watch the video at [this link](#). There are many things to consider with RCV, both pros, and cons.

Pros:

- Ensures that the winner of an election carries a majority of voters
- Deepens the influence of the voter by supporting more than one candidate in order of preference.
- Eliminates the need for a primary. Voters only have to vote once in the general election.
- The City would need to commit to an increased level of voter education which could enhance voter turnout

Cons:

- The process of determining a voter can be more complicated to understand for voters used to the traditional method.
- If a race is close and you get to the 5th, 6th, 7th, etc. rankings some voters may stop ranking, thus exhausting their ballot.
- Sandy would be a major test case for RCV in Utah. Only Payson and Vineyard have held RCV elections and their ballots combined are a small fraction of what Sandy's turnout would be.
- The City would need to commit to an increased level of voter education.

Because of the short decision time, I'm asking for your help. Please share this with your Sandy friends and send me an email. Do you like Ranked Choice Voting for Sandy? If so, when should do you believe we should implement it?







Rare Development Moratorium Approved East of Wasatch Blvd.

Last week on April 6th, the city council voted unanimously 7-0 to approve a moratorium on development east of Wasatch Boulevard in the mapped area shown. This is a rare and temporary action by the city council to take time to study serious public safety concerns the council has about pursuing development in an environmentally unique and sensitive area in our city. This moratorium cannot exceed 6 months and will give city staff time to study and report back to council (and to you, our residents) on whether changes should be adopted to our land development code to address growing public safety concerns of building on steep slopes along the foothills and the impact to adjacent properties.

The public comment included residents who phoned in wanting to expand the moratorium area to include “the triangle” north boundaries of the city, north of Little Cottonwood Road but since that was not noticed in the public meeting material it will be addressed separately. I think this is a good idea since the conditions and concerns are so similar and the area is small enough to include in the same study. It just makes sense.

I will bring my proposal to expand the study area to the Council, tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, April 27th and I ask for your participation. Please email me with your thoughts on this moratorium and any issues we should be attuned to as we weigh development interests in high East Sandy.





Bulk Waste Update


When you see the crews working in your neighborhood, give them a wave and appreciation for all they do to keep Sandy beautiful. Here's a photo of the activity on my

to residents next Monday, April 19th, 2021. I look forward to many of you again who frequent the Senior Center for classes, lunch, and discussion.



Peruvian Park Elementary


