

# SANDY CITY PARKS MASTER PLAN

FALL 2023 PUBLIC OPINION RESEARCH



- 1. Satisfaction with parks, trails, recreation and open spaces in Sandy City is very high, with all having at least 70% satisfaction or higher. Most respondents also say the city has the right amount of each of these amenities, but 48% of respondents say there are too few open spaces. Familiarity with recreation programs is low at slightly more than 50%.
- 2. Usage of and satisfaction with parks in Sandy is very high, with over half of respondents saying they use parks a few times a month or more. A high proportion of respondents say no improvements are needed to parks.
- 3. Respondents say they use trails in Sandy less often than they visit parks, with only 1 in 3 saying they use them a few times a month or more. In terms of improvements to trails, there is broad interest in linking trails to neighborhoods, completing trails and creating a more connected trail system.
- 4. Very few respondents in our sample have participated in a recreation department program during the past 2 years. Respondents say this is mainly due to age or lack of interest, and there are few suggestions for additional programs the city could offer that would interest them.
- 5. When asked to allocated funds from a hypothetical budget, the items that have the highest support are related to open spaces, trails, and parks. Respondents are split on whether the city should focus on improving existing amenities or developing new ones, with most showing preference for some mix of the two. Between the two extremes, there is a slight preference for improving existing amenities.


#### SURVEY METHODOLOGY

Survey invitations were sent via email and text message to a previously recruited citywide resident panel.

Responses were collected from October 28-November 15, 2023.

In total, 509 residents responded to this panel survey, resulting in a margin of error of approximately +- 4.30 percentage points.


Responses were weighted to reflect the demographic composition of the city as a whole. Responses have also been geocoded into City Council Districts to allow for geographic analysis of attitudes and behaviors.

# GENERAL SATISFACTION & ATTITUDES

### SANDY RESIDENTS ENJOY HIGH QUALITY OF LIFE

Respondents say their quality of life in Sandy is high, with an average response of 83 out of 100. In a linear prediction model of quality of life, we also found that satisfaction with city parks and trails both have a significant positive effect on quality of life.

#### Quality of Life





#### RESIDENTS SATISFIED WITH REC OPPORTUNITIES

Satisfaction with parks, trails, canyon access, and natural open spaces is high. Most respondents also say the city has enough parks, trails, and canyon access areas. However, nearly half of respondents say there aren't enough natural open spaces in Sandy.

Q: Thinking about Sandy's recreational amenities, are you generally satisfied or dissatisfied with each of the following? (n = 508)



# PARKS & FACILITIES

# MAJORITY USE PARKS/REC SPACES VERY OFTEN

Just over half of respondents (54%) use parks, open spaces, or recreational facilities in Sandy multiple times a month, and a total of 66% use them at least once a month. Rates of use have noticeable differences by certain demographic factors, such as age, race, education, and income.



#### FLAT IRON MESA, BELL CANYON MOST POPULAR PARKS

Flat Iron Mesa Park and Bell Canyon Park have been visited by about 4 in 10 respondents in the last year. Flat Iron Mesa Park is the park most often selected as most-often visited, with Dimple Dell Regional close behind. Though there are some parks that are utilized more frequently, there is no one clear winner or loser, indicating that all of Sandy's parks are being utilized by residents.




Q: Which Sandy parks, open spaces, or recreational facilities have you or your household used or visited in the past 12 months? Please select all that apply. (n = 475)

### MOST FAVORITE PARKS ARE CLOSE TO HOME

The most common reason given for choosing their favorite park was being "close to home", selected by over half of respondents. Additionally, this reason is also the top reason for visiting Sandy's most frequented parks—Flat Iron Mesa, Dimple Dell Regional, and Falcon Parks.





#### THOSE IN DISTRICTS 2 & 3 VISIT PARKS MORE OFTEN

While slightly over half of all respondents visit parks a few times a month or more, two thirds of those in district 3 do, and those in district 2 are slightly more likely to visit parks that often. The top reason for visiting favorite parks across all districts was proximity to home, but trails and physical fitness were also frequently selected reasons.



#### OWNERS, RENTERS VISIT PARKS AT SIMILAR RATES

Rates of park visitation are nearly the same between homeowners and home renters in our survey sample. Most common reasons respondents gave for visiting their favorite parks also didn't differ much between home ownership status, with proximity to home, trails, and physical fitness being the most common reasons given by both groups. Those who are renting are slightly more likely to say they visit their favorite parks for physical fitness.



#### 3 IN 10 SAY NO IMPROVEMENTS NEEDED

When asked what improvements respondents want on their favorite park, about 3 in 10 say no improvements are needed. The next most common responses include lighting/safety features, restrooms, playground equipment, and trees and greenery, each selected by over 10% of respondents.



## PATHS, TREES COMMON WANTS FOR PARKS

When asked what additional amenities should be added to Sandy City parks, 1 in 4 cite the need for additional walking/jogging paths, and 1 in 5 report wanting more trees/greenery. Athletic courts, water-wise landscaping, off-leash dog areas, and shade are also commonly selected.



#### **NEARLY ALL RESPONDENTS FEEL SAFE IN PARKS**

Nearly all respondents (90%) say they feel at least somewhat safe in city parks, with 49% saying they feel very safe. Among those who say they feel unsafe, common concerns include homelessness, drug use, and troublemaking by teenagers, among other things.




## NON-VISITORS TO PARKS LACK INTEREST, TIME

Only a very small proportion of respondents (4%) never use or visit park, open spaces, or rec facilities in Sandy. Among these 24 respondents, the most common reason given is a lack of interest or time, indicating there are likely no significant barriers to entry for using parks, open spaces, or rec facilities.



#### RESIDENTS COMMONLY VISIT PARKS OUTSIDE SANDY

In addition to using and visiting parks, open spaces, and rec facilities in Sandy, many respondents commonly use or visit them outside of Sandy, with about 1 in 3 visiting or using a few times a month or more. Accumulatively, nearly all respondents (95%) visit parks or recreational amenities outside Sandy at least once a year. Younger residents, more educated residents, and those with higher income levels are among the most likely to travel outside of Sandy to recreate.



### RESIDENTS UTILIZE TRAILS OUTSIDE OF SANDY

Among the 95% of residents who travel outside of Sandy to recreate, the most common reasons given include trails and the change of scenery – each selected by over 1/3 of respondents.

#### Reasons for Visiting Parks Outside of Sandy







# TRAILS

#### ONLY 29% USE TRAILS MORE THAN ONCE A MONTH

Only about 1 in 3 responses (29%) use or visit trails more than once a month, and 43% visit them once a month. Rates of use are fairly similar across most demographic factors but differ noticeably by age and income.



# BELL CANYON, DIMPLE DELL, COUNTY PARKS MOST POPULAR TRAILS

Around half of respondents say they've visited Bell Canyon Reservoir trails in the past year, but other trails are also heavily utilized. 1 in 5 say they visit city park walking/jogging paths most often, and half of respondents say their most frequented trails are either city park, Bell Canyon, or Dimple Dell trails.




Q: Which Sandy trails have you or your household used or visited in the past 12 months? Please select all that apply. (n = 361)

#### MOST USE TRAILS TO EXERCISE, SPEND TIME IN NATURE

Nearly all respondents use trails in Sandy either for walking, jogging, or other exercise; or for spending time in nature. Biking is another common activity, selected by about 1 in 5 respondents. The top reasons given for trail use overall align well with use of individual trails, though photography is a common reason for visiting the Bell Canyon Reservoir trails.



#### THOSE IN DISTRICTS 3 & 4 USE TRAILS MORE OFTEN

Compared to the overall sample and the other two districts, respondents in districts 3 and 4 visit trails in Sandy more often, with 42% of those in district 3 going a few times or month or more, and 35% of those in district 4 going that often. Walking and jogging is still the most common reason for using trails across all districts, with spending time in nature being close behind in frequency.

#### OWNERS, RENTERS USE TRAILS AT SIMILAR RATES

Rates of trail usage are nearly the same between homeowners and home renters in our survey sample. Most common reasons respondents gave for using trails also didn't differ much between home ownership status, with walking/jogging/exercise, and spending time in nature being the most common reasons given by both groups. Renters were significantly less likely to respond with "recreational biking", and more likely to respond with "photography", but the large difference is likely due to the small sample size of renters in our data.

# RESPONDENTS WANT MORE CONNECTED TRAILS, PET DISPOSAL STATIONS

When asked about needed improvements to Sandy trails, about 1 in 4 request more pet waste disposal stations. Linking neighborhoods with trails and making trails more connected are also common responses, indicating a need for a more interconnected trail system. Only 14% say no improvements are needed to city trails.

#### NEARLY ALL RESIDENTS FEEL SAFE ON TRAILS

Nearly all respondents (91%) say they feel at least somewhat safe on city trails, with 41% saying they feel very safe. Among those who say they feel unsafe, common concerns include homelessness, drug use, and dogs off leashes among other things.


# MOST NON-TRAIL USERS HAVE NO INTEREST; SOME WANT MORE INFO

Only a small proportion of respondents (16%) never use or visit trails in Sandy. Among these 78 respondents, the most common reason given is a lack of desire, indicating that there are no major barriers to entry for using trails. Notably, about 1 in 4 say they lacked information about city trails, revealing a potential avenue for recourse.

#### Reasons for Not Visiting Trails in Sandy





# TRANSPORTATION TO & AROUND PARKS/TRAILS

#### MOST GET TO PARKS AND TRAILS BY DRIVING

Driving is the most popular method of transportation respondents take to get to parks and trails, with 62% saying they drove to go to the park the last time they went, and 59% saying they drove last they traveled to a trail. About 1 in 3 say they walked, and all other methods, including biking and public transit, were collectively used by around 3 or 4% of respondents for either destination.




Q: When thinking about the last time you visited a Sandy park, how did you travel to the park? (n = 482)

#### BIKERS FEEL SAFER ON TRAILS THAN ON ROADS

Most respondents who say they bike on trails in Sandy (22%) say they also ride bikes on streets or roads in the city. A majority of respondents who ride bikes say they feel safe on most kinds of biking paths, including trails, sidewalks, and bike lanes. A majority of bikers feel unsafe in bike routes or sharrows and many do not feel safe in bike lanes.




Q: How often do you ride a bicycle on streets or roads in Sandy (i.e., not including mountain biking)? (n = 94)

# GENERAL RECREATION

# OLDER RESPONDENTS WITH NO KIDS DON'T PARTICIPATE IN REC PROGRAMS

Most respondents (76%) say they haven't participated in a city recreation program in the past 2 years, but do not report any major barriers to entry. Non-participants are older, don't have kids, or have no interest. When asked for suggestions about additional types of programs the city could offer, about half had none, but those that offer suggestions focus primarily on adult programs and classes, as well as opportunities for pickleball, swimming, and indoor recreation.



# Reasons for not participating in Recreation Department Programs





### HIGH INTEREST IN RELAXING, OPEN SPACES

When asked about the kinds of spaces that are important to have close to home, 1/3 of respondents cite the need for a place to relax and enjoy the outdoors, with spaces to take kids to play and exercise also being popular. When asked about the kinds of spaces they would like more of in Sandy, respondents are split between wanting to see more large open spaces, urban trails, connections to canyon trails, and parks in developed neighborhoods.




Q: In your opinion, which of the following spaces would be most important to have close to your home? A place to... (n = 482)

#### WORD OF MOUTH & NEWSLETTER ARE INFO SOURCES

Most respondents say they get information about city recreation programs either by word of mouth or by the newsletter (70% of respondents use at least one of these sources). Most respondents also don't say they need additional means of communication from the recreation department, but there is some interest in email, and other mailers.



#### Additional Means of Communication




Q: Generally speaking, how do you get information about Sandy Recreation programs and services? Please select all that apply. (n = 431)

#### **OPEN SPACES & TRAILS HIGHEST BUDGET PRIORITIES**


When asked how they would allocate \$100 to Sandy City parks, recreation, trails, and open space, residents prioritize acquisition or preservation of open space and walking and biking trails. By contrast, options like a skate park, disc golf, equestrian facilities, and acquiring more property are seen as lower priorities.

# RESPONDENTS SPLIT ON IMPROVING EXISTING AMENITIES VS ADDING NEW ONES

In a hypothetical scenario where respondents were asked to allocate funding between improving existing amenities (represented as 0 on the 0-10 scale) or developing new amenities (represented by 10), most responses fall somewhere in the middle, with the average response being about 4.4. Though the majority of respondents prefer some combination of the two, there is a slight preference overall for focusing on existing amenities rather than creating new ones.




