Long-Term Financial Analysis Fire Department (Conducted in 2017)

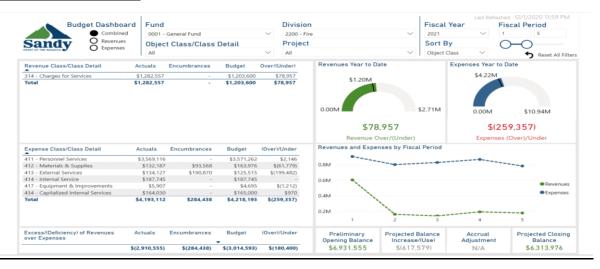
- 21 Firefighters

The long-term planning will be updated in 2021.

FY 2021 Fire Budget Priorities

- Compensation Continue to fund the Step and Grade for retention and recruitment.
- Staffing 7 FF/PM to make 3-man Truck/Engine and staff 4 ambulances. Deeper bench.
- Mental Health Program Use Existing EAP services instead
- Gap-time Increase to meet demand
- Uniforms/PPE Increase to meet demand
- Equipment 0&M
- Lexipol Policy Management Completed in house by FD personnel
- Fleet Management Fire Engine scheduled for last year

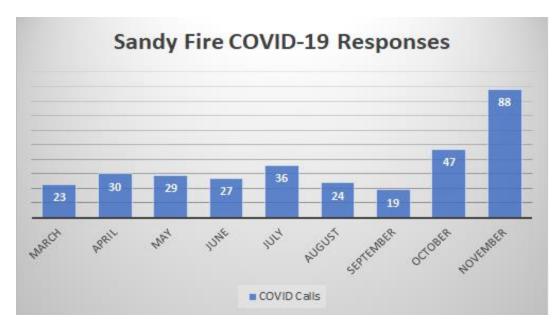

Sandy Fire By the Numbers in 2020

- Total Staff of 87 includes 76 combat employees and 11 administrative staff
- Fire Calls to Date = 1,731
- Medical Calls to Date = 5,331
 - Transports = 2,209
 - COVID Related Calls = 323



- Average Response Time = 5.865 Minutes
- Training Hours
 - Total Hours = 21,686, 1,800 Hours Average Per Month
- Inspections
 - 974 Inspections to Include: New Business License, State Inspections, Fire Sprinkler, Fire Alarm, Hood Systems, Firework Stands and Food Trucks
 - 114 Plan Reviews Include: Residential, Commercial, Food Trucks and Tanks
 - 50 Fire Investigations with Follow Ups
 - 23 Bond Releases
 - 21 Lock Box and Knox Fire Department Caps Installed
- Fire Hydrants = 5,700 Inspected Twice Yearly
- Prevention Education
 - 148 Programs to Include: Schools, Community Events, Business Trainings and Sandy Employee Trainings with 3,232 People Who Attended
 - 125 Programs Cancelled Due to COVID
